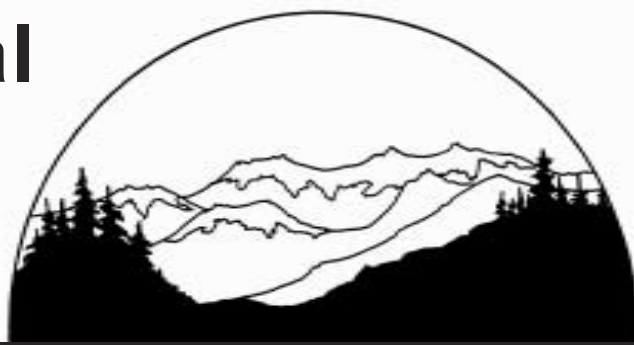

**CLUB MEMBER AWARDS:** Nancy Tinker will obtain the logo artwork needed for the plaques. The requirement for attendance at a minimum of 6 meetings will be dropped this year. # Fear of People

Although it is possible for a fearful dog to be frightened of his owners, this is rarely the case. Fearfulness is usually expressed toward strangers, toward unfamiliar people outside the family circle who are not frequent visitors to the household.

Sometimes a dog that is frightened of people may have his targets fairly well defined. For example, his fear may be of men with white beards or men wearing boots. In other instances, dogs may respond to several different categories of fear-inducing people, men of large stature, men with deep voices, etc. Note that it is men rather than women who are most often the subjects of dogs fearfulness.

Children are also common sources of fear for dogs, too, particularly male children. Then again, some dogs are frightened of all strangers, whatever their age, sex, height, weight, or other physical characteristics. These dogs are pathetic creatures that

have, no doubt, experienced a lifetime of mistreatment.

## Responses to Fear

One of the most common responses of the fearful dog is aggression. Other responses are more passive, including those of avoidance, hiding, running away, and thigmotaxic behavior (staying close to the wall). Fearful dogs display their emotions by means of their facial expression and body postures, as well as exhibiting various involuntary responses, such as trembling, salivating, pupillary dilatation, evacuation of bowels or bladder, and discharge of anal glands. Dogs that are frightened of people avert their eyes, lower their head, flatten their ears, tuck their body and tail (hunkering down to make themselves smaller), and may roll over to expose their underbelly and urinate. All this body language is designed to appease the would-be attacker by signaling a

diminutive status.

## How Dogs Become Fearful

Like everything else, nature and nurture both play a role in the development of fears. Some dogs seem naturally fearful of people. Dogs that show familial nervousness may have hormonal disturbances, such as sub-clinical hypothyroidism (a condition in which the thyroid gland is under producing the hormone, thyroxine) but for many the true cause of their genetic fearfulness remains unknown.

Learning provides the other component necessary for the development of fear. Lack of appropriate exposure and/or adverse exposures during the sensitive period of development favors the development of fear. For example, a dog that is overly fearful of people may not have been exposed to people during the sensitive period of his development, i.e. between 3 and 12 weeks of age. If during this time a dog is raised without human company he may

never be entirely comfortable in the presence of unfamiliar people. While not necessarily hostile to strangers, the dog may appear fearful in their presence and may attempt to avoid them or hide.

Truly adverse experiences at the hands of cruel people during the sensitive period is worse than plain undersocialization. Such heinous experiences lead to the more specific fears alluded to above i.e. fear of men with white beards, tall hats, etc. Men and children, it seems, are most likely to behave inappropriately towards dogs during the sensitive period of development (and beyond) and thus are most often the subjects of dogs' fearfulness and mistrust. While nature and nurture can be considered separately for their input into excessively fearfulness, both components are necessary for its expression.

## Black Dog Ghost Legends

There are many instances of black dog ghosts which are said to haunt lanes, bridges, crossroads, footpaths and gates, particularly in Suffolk, Norfolk and the Isle of Man.

Some black dogs are said to be unquiet ghosts of wicked souls, but others are friendly guides and protectors to travellers; the Barguest of northern England could also appear as a pig or a goat, but was most commonly a huge black dog with large eyes and feet which left no prints.

Packs of ghostly hounds have also been recorded all over Britain, often heard howling as they pass by on stormy nights rather than actually seen; these hounds generally foretell death, or at least disaster, if they are seen and the proper action is to drop face-down onto the ground to avoid spotting them.

# Louisville KY Animal Control Legislation Passed

I would like to say a couple of things about the Louisville situation. The HSUS has a paid lobbyist in most states.

Reports from Louisville indicated that HSUS was right in there working away. We also had a situation where the animal control person there, who has a very interesting and checkered history has serious control issues. What started out as a knee jerk BSL banning response to two incidents where dogs actually killed someone turned into a total rewrite of the dog laws taking away people's rights without regard to the concerns of responsible dog owners.

Many of us had communications from people in Louisville when this all started which was months ago. When Metro Council members took the dog issue on in a partisan way, things went downhill fast.

However, these letters suggesting that AKC should be doing more bring to mind that inevitably when we, the dog fancy, lose a big one like Louisville someone has to say its the AKC's fault. I say get a grip here! AKC does not have the resources of HSUS. AKC actually does a huge amount for our sport and the people in the legislative department work very hard for us. Would it be nice to have as much money as HSUS and be able to place a full time paid lobbyist anywhere we wanted? You bet. But with what money are you planning to do this? HSUS has no shelters to support and they have vast millions of dollars and a group of hard core no-animal-use vegan animal rightists at the top of their food chain. Their leader doesn't even have an animal of any kind. We, on the other hand, have many dog obsessed fanciers running from show to show looking for that next ribbon and working hard to breed, groom, train, handle, judge and take care of their dogs.

We, the dog fancy, have to get our act together and get off our duffs.

We, each and every one of us, have to pull our heads from the sand and recognize what is going on around this country.

Several years ago, PETA announced their No Birth Nation Campaign. They are running with it. A number of the ordinances that have popped up have the same M.O. Often, like Los Angeles and Louisville, they start life as BSL issues and end up with mandatory spay / neuter of all dogs unless owners pay a very distorted intact animal fee, a breeder license fee, and are forced to dog limits and a litter limit. When these things start as BSL issues, we have the small core of Bully breed owners working like crazy and everyone else says, well gee my dog isn't a problem, sure hope the Bully people can keep their rights.

In California, I would have to say the vast majority of breeders are "underground." They have been for years. A lot of breeders have operated under the assumption if they are good owners, don't cause any trouble and keep a low profile, they won't be reeled in. As the rules and laws have been tightened there on animal ownership, it becomes harder and harder to get people to come out in force to oppose issues because they are already underground. The LA ordinance was certainly proof of that.

Once the LA ordinance got passed, it started to spread. Louisville is part of that spread. We can all look forward to seeing similar proposals spring up around the country now. It is very sad.

Will people be able to breed dogs for us to judge in the future? It certainly is becoming more difficult. We, the judges, should take note. We have to be involved as part of the solution. AKC is there to help as much as they can. I have worked very diligently here in my state and the AKC Legislative Department has always been a great help to us. But *Continued on page 7*

*"Mayor Jerry Abramson has signed into law major changes to the Louisville Animal Control Ordinance and the news is not good for fanciers, breeders and responsible animal owners. The provisions in the ordinance contain a pet limit, severe restrictions on the keeping of intact animals, licensing of in-home kennels, extreme differential licensing and vague definitions. Below is a brief summary of the provisions in the 91-page ordinance that will have the greatest impact on breeders, fanciers and responsible dog owners."*

*Ms. McGowan is a Best in Show Judge who is proactive in protecting breeder and pet owners' rights. April, 2005 the AKC announced she was named a recipient of the AKC Community Achievement Award .*

*She received recognition for her service as Legislative Liaison between the Papillion Club of America and the American Shetland Sheepdog Association. Charlotte was also named legislative chair for the Massachusetts Federation of Dog Clubs.*

*She is also the legislative point person for the National Animal Interest Alliance Trust, an association dedicated to promoting animal welfare, supporting responsible animal use and strengthening the bond between humans and animals..*

it is each person in their own town, city, county or state that has to be involved to keep our right intact. Best to send your letters to the politicians who are making the decision. Best to have actual constituents doing that important work. If we don't get involved, our rights go out the door and so does our sport.

Those in our sport who are not directly involved in grass roots fighting to keep our rights need to wake up and do their part. And their part is not to tell AKC to work harder or to tell those in the trenches there is no animal rights movement but to figure out how they can use their energy to be a part of the solution. Once we start fighting with each other, we lose.

It is my hope the lawsuits I understand will be filed in Louisville related to this ordinance will prove successful in overturning it. But the damage is done. So what's going on in your town, city or state related to dog laws? Do you know?

## Louisville Legislation in a Nutshell

*The following is a synopsis (emphasis mine). For more details, please check the web site.—Editor*

- \$300 Animal Dealer License AND a \$150 Class A Kennel License to sell a litter.
- Metro Animal Services (MAS) may inspect the breeder's premises any time.
- \$35 unaltered animal license fee per dog.
- \$9 altered animal license fee per dog.
- More than four altered pets, residents may apply for a \$28 (plus \$6/dog over four dogs) multiple license. NOT available to residents with ONE intact animal.
- Absences from primary residence more than three days, owner must notify MAS in writing. Applies to those who board or travel for any reason.

- ALL intact animals must be microchipped, and enclosures approved by MAS.
- Female in heat prohibited from contact with another animal (INCLUDING other females or neutered males) except for planned breeding.
- Limits residents to 3 dogs on less than half acre and 7 dogs between half an acre and two acres.
- Dog removed from a kennel must be revaccinated (including dogs sold to another home).
- Kennels (where pets are kept 24 hours) must purchase license from \$30-\$180 and MUST comply with materials approved for runs. Dirt and gravel NOT approved.
