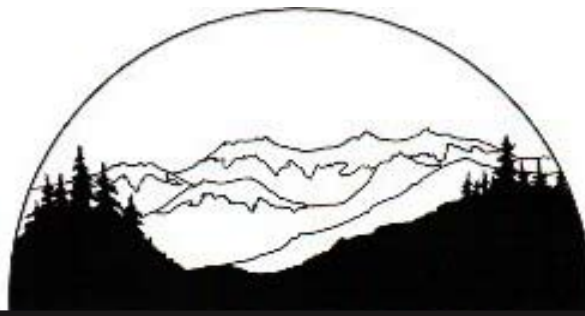

HRKC March 2007 General Meeting

The March General Meeting of the Hurricane Ridge Kennel Club was preceded by a talk and AKC video on gait, presented by Bill Holbrook.

Officers Present:

Joe Larson, President; Mariko Saum, Vice-President; Mary Franden, Secretary; Nancy Tinker, Board Member; Melissa Smith, Board Member; Sarah Kincaid, Board Member

An attendance sign-in sheet was circulated: There were 23 members and 2 guests present.

The meeting was called to order by President Joe Larson at 8:10 p.m. on March 21, 2007. Joe asked for a roll call of the members and guests who were present.

A. Approval of Minutes

Minutes from the February General Meeting were approved as published in the Newsletter.

B. President's Report

Joe Larson discussed the current AKC survey seeking input on whether or not the AKC should open performance events to mixed breed dogs. He also commented on pending anti-dog legislation in California.

C. Secretary's Report

Nothing to report.

D. Treasurer's Report

Ron Fye was absent. Balances in club accounts are unchanged from the beginning of the year.

E. Committee Reports

AWARDS: Nothing new to report.

HISTORIAN: Anne Andritsch thanked Mary for the newspaper article on Chris Cornell and the TDI Therapy Dog program.

MEMBERSHIP: Jan Garrison noted that an updated membership roster is pending. There are also four membership applications pending. Two were voted on: Melinda Olsen and Joan Etheridge. Both were approved, and

Jan welcomed the new members to the club.

NEWSLETTER: Patricia Pedersen thanked the group for the excellent material some have sent for the newsletter, and asked members to keep the good stuff coming. She also noted that the deadline for submissions to the newsletter is the first Wednesday of each month, so that the newsletter can be published on the second Wednesday of the month.

TRAINING: Nothing new to report.

2007 SHOW CHAIR: Mariko Saum reported that one of the judges for the July show, Ronald Krone, has died. Mariko will look into whether or not we can proceed without hiring an additional judge.

Mariko also reviewed fees. Fees will be the same for Rally and Obedience as for Conformation: \$25 for a first entry, \$18 for the second entry of the same dog.

Arrangements for dumpsters and a water truck were discussed.

The premium list must be done by no later than May 1st. All changes/additions must be completed by that date.

Trophies: Please let Jan Garrison know if you would be willing to sponsor a trophy. She needs this information by April 13th. Jan reviewed the list of trophies from last year. Trophies will be the same for this year's show. Robin will coordinate the Bred-By trophy, and will coordinate details for the premium list before we send it to BaRay.

2008 SHOW CHAIR: Joe will need to get a copy of the 2007 judges list, and will provide copies for the membership.

AGILITY CHAIR: Nancy reported that the entries for the spring trial closed on Monday. The entries are fewer than expected. Nancy asked club members to come out and help get the fencing

up. There was an agreement to meet on Friday, March 23, beginning at 1:00 p.m. to put up the fence.

There is also a need for help during the show, April 13 – 15. We will be setting up on April 12th, beginning at 9:00 a.m., and need help unloading the trailer and setting up the rings. Help is also needed on Friday/Saturday/ Sunday for the show itself. We won't be using the large canopies, as we don't want to risk wind damage. We will use the pop-ups only.

PROGRAMS: Nancy volunteered a series of educational videos for breeders, beginning with a seminar by Dr. Hutchinson on the pregnant bitch. It was agreed to start the video at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 18th, prior to the start of the regular monthly meeting. Members who are interested in viewing the video can come at 6:00; otherwise, the regular meeting will begin at 7:00, as usual.

PUBLIC EDUCATION: Ron was absent.

F. Unfinished Business

Three items of unfinished business were introduced:

The club donated \$500.00 to the *Collie Heath Foundation* in Bill Holbrook's name.

Chris Cornell said that the "Treats and Toys for Afghanistan" program was successful, and thanked everyone who donated, including Hope Williams of *Best Friends*, who provided wholesale toys and treats. Chris will be following up, shipping 41 pounds of toys and treats.

A good letter from Janelle May in Italy was published in the March newsletter, and members were encouraged to check it out if they have not already done so.

E. Report of the Committees

2007 All-Breed Show: Mariko reported on Judges for the 2007 show. We may need a replacement judge, due to the death of one of the contracted judges. Ron will need the name for the hotel. Judge Frost is waiving his fee. Mariko will contact the Cavalier King Charles Club to find out whether or not there will be a supported entry for the show. The Cavalier club will be hosting a BBQ dinner at the 7 Cedars Casino on Friday, July 27th. They would like to announce the dinner in the premium. Mariko will follow up.

The Judges' dinner will be hosted by Del and Sharon Delabarre.

2008 All-Breed Show: Joe will need the 2007 judge list from Mariko. The 2008/2009 contract with BaRay will be ready next week. Joe will provide a copy for review.

Joe led a discussion on the show site for future shows. If we lose access to the Blake Family Property, we will need to identify an alternate site. Possible sites might include the area north of Carrie Blake Park, the High School (RV parking would be problematic), the Sequim airport, or possibly the property at the NE corner of Old Olympic Hwy and Kitchen Dick.

We would need a minimum of ten flat usable acres.

Agility Trials: Nancy said entries for the spring trial are still coming in. She will need people to help set up fences the weekend before. Nancy said that Chris Cornell reported that the area looks like it is in good shape so far. Nancy is still waiting for the new equipment (wings and tunnel holders) that was ordered.

Awards: Nancy is waiting for information from Award winners so that she can provide this information for the newsletter.

Breed Referral: Ron reported an average of about 4 inquiries per week.

Programs: Nancy led a discussion on providing educational video programs at club General Meetings. These programs take approximately one hour. The board agreed to ask the membership in the March meeting if they would like to start the General Meetings one hour earlier, at 6:00 p.m., to accommodate the length of the video presentations.

Website: Mary reported that the web site committee is working on a new design for the opening page of the web site. Design improvements for the other pages will follow.

Do You Know the Real PETA and The Humane Society of the United States

You will not often see negative articles in our newsletters, but every now and again we are forced to make a stand, and to speak out about what we know is for the better good for all involved. This is one such instance. We can no longer stand back and watch to see what will happen. I think that it is past time to publicly expose the real agenda of the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and their cohorts in crime, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), and the animal rights agenda.

For many years we have all enjoyed the companionship of our dogs and other animals. We have been busy playing with them, taking care of them, finding fun things that we could do with them, and generally just having a great time with all the animals that live in our houses. While we have been enjoying the love and fun that our animals provide to us, there have been groups out there organizing on a grand scale trying to get our rights to own those animals taken away. Yes, that is exactly what I meant. Make no mistake about it. These people have organized on a large scale to infiltrate many major city councils and governments in the country to spread their propaganda. Their agenda is easily defined and simple. Their main objective is to take away your right to own animals. They do not want you to have the companionship of any animal, whether that is a dog, cat, horse, mouse, frog, fish or any other animal that you can think of. They are pooling their resources to get this accomplished, and have millions of dollars in their war chest for this effort.

This is a statement made by Ingrid Newkirk, the President of PETA: "I don't use the word 'pet.' I think it's speciesist language. I prefer 'companion animal.' For one thing, we would no longer allow breeding. People could not create different breeds. There would be no pet

shops. If people had companion animals in their homes, those animals would have to be refugees from the animal shelters and the streets. You would have a protective relationship with them just as you would with an orphaned child. But as the surplus of cats and dogs (artificially engineered by centuries of forced breeding) declined, eventually companion animals would be phased out, and we would return to a more symbiotic relationship – enjoyment at a distance." — The Harper's Forum Book, Jack Hitt, ed., 1989, p.223.

It is interesting that Ms. Newkirk used the word "speciesist". Allwords.com defines that word as follows:

1. The discrimination against, and exploitation of, animals by humans in the belief that humans are superior to all other species of animals and can therefore justify putting them to their own use.

One of the animal rights mantras is that all animals are created to be equal to all humans, and should have the same rights as humans.

Just in case it still isn't clear to you what their agenda is, here are a few more quotes from Ingrid Newkirk:

"One day, we would like an end to pet shops and the breeding of animals. [Dogs] would pursue their natural lives in the wild ... they would have full lives, not wasting at home for someone to come home in the evening and pet them and then sit there and watch TV."

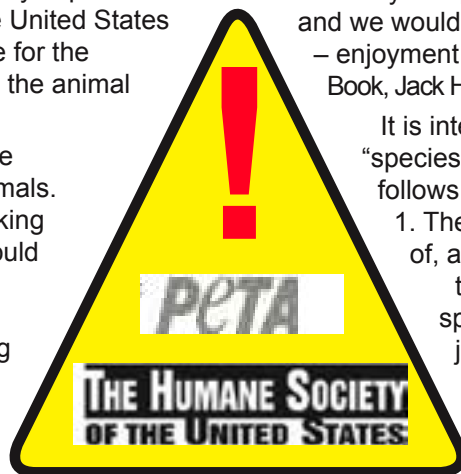

Who is Ingrid Newkirk, and why should we care what she has to say about anything? In the 1970s, Newkirk worked for Montgomery County (Maryland), and then for the District of Columbia, as an animal protection officer and deputy sheriff, before becoming DC's first female Poundmaster in 1978. She co-founded PETA in 1980 with established animal-rights activist Alex Pacheco. (1) PETA stands for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, but in my opinion, there is nothing ethical in what they do.

Ms. Newkirk has very close ties with several groups identified by the FBI as known terrorists groups, such as Animal Liberation Front (ALF). The animal rights groups are very well organized, and when you check closely, you will see many of the same names sitting on the boards of these radical groups. They are intertwined and closely linked through their finances, and the work that they do.

PETA operates on an annual budget of \$ 29,000,000. Most of this is from donations made by ordinary citizens that don't know the real work of PETA. Many people think that they are out to save the lives of animals after seeing all of their ads on TV and in the newspapers. That is why millions are donated to them each year.

In Virginia, the home state of PETA, in 2004, PETA adopted out 361 animals, and euthanized 2,278, according to their records. (2) Those figures aren't good. That means that they euthanized 86.3% of their animals and only adopted out 13.7%. These figures come directly from PETA's Annual Report and from their 2004 Tax Return. It doesn't seem like they used that \$29 million for the betterment of the majority of the animals that they came in contact with. So where is the money going? It is being spent for publicity to raise more money for one thing. It is also being used for legislative purposes. They have placed key people in city governments all over the country to try to influence legislation to take your pet ownership rights away. And they are having a lot of success with it.

You need to understand the basic difference between the "animal welfare" groups and "animal rights" groups. Although the names might sound like they have the same objectives, there is a big difference. Animal welfare groups are working to see that all animals are treated humanely. Animal rights groups are working to see that all ownership of animals comes to an end.

As I said, PETA has close ties with many other organizations. One of those organizations is the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS). People donate millions to the HSUS each year, thinking that their money is going to save the lives of millions of animals. Nothing could be further from the truth. The HSUS does not own a single animal shelter anywhere in the country. Although many shelters have the words Humane Society in their names, they are not associated in any way with the HSUS. The HSUS does not sponsor any spay or neuter clinic anywhere in the country. They do donate a very small percent of the annual budget to a few local humane societies, around \$2 million annually, which just happens to be less than the amount that they spend in travel each year. Their major money is sent on fund raising and legislative activity. In 2005 they spent \$28 million for public mailings, \$6 million in vegan education, \$10 million in legislative campaigns and litigation. Their income for that year was close to \$125 million.

The HSUS was founded in 1954 as an animal welfare organization. But in the early 1980's, just about the same

time as PETA was founded, they began to change to an animal rights organization. In the 1990's the personnel began to change to better fit with their new purpose, and today many of the personnel at HSUS have ties to PETA, including the current President, Wayne Pacelle.

This is an interesting quote from Wayne Pacelle: "We have no ethical obligation to preserve the different breeds of livestock produced through selective breeding ...One generation and out. We have no problems with the extinction of domestic animals. They are creations of human selective breeding." - Animal People News (May 1, 1993) (3) When you combine other statements that he has made, with the above statement, in my opinion the meaning of this statement is that if we could spay and neuter all animals, we could eliminate pet ownership within one generation. "One generation and out" would mean to me that they are gone and are eliminated in only one generation.

Quietly sitting back and maybe not being aware, we are now allowing the HSUS to make presentations at our local schools, with the definite purpose to educate our children about how bad pet ownership is, to indoctrinate children to the thought that animals should be free and not kept as pets. They are doing this in the same way that they have infiltrated city councils and local governments all across the country, quietly and matter-of-factly.

"Shortly after taking office, Pacelle announced a merger with the Fund For Animals which have assets of over \$20 million, and the Doris Day Animal League. The combined

group estimated its 2005 budget at "over \$95 million" and also announced the formation of a new "political organization," which will "allow for a more substantial investment of resources in political and lobbying activities." (4)

So that is where we find ourselves today. With the

HSUS and PETA combined annual budgets of over \$124 million for political and lobbying efforts to take away our rights to own animals. And that figure does not include the many splinter organizations that have been formed from these two major organizations. We are in an uphill battle now, and it will be the fight of our lives to keep our rights to own pets.

They are going at it from many different angles. One way is to get Breed Specific Legislation (BSL) passed. The banning of Pit-Bulls all over the country is a good example. That has caught on like wildfires. The animal rights groups have said if they can just get one breed banned, then it will be easy to add others to it at a later date, until

eventually all breeds are banned. Another way that they are going about it is to have a mandatory spay and neuter law in place. Just think about it, if all domestic animals are spayed and neutered, when they die, there will be no more domestic animals. Those same words have been said by Wayne Pacelle, the President of the HSUS. They have a very well thought out and planned agenda, and they are counting on the ignorance of the American people to get their agenda accomplished. Well guess what: Ignorance can be overcome by education. The American people may be ignorant about the facts, but they are not stupid. They can be educated. We were ignorant before 9-11, and look what effect that had. It caused all Americans to become educated and unite and fight to prevent that from happening again. The difference here is that we are being attacked from within our own country. We are under strong attack by the animal rights groups, and I hope that we don't just stand by and allow it to happen.

The animal rights groups are publicly stating that we need to get laws passed so that they can close down all the puppy mills and commercial breeding facilities that have their animals living in inhumane conditions. Just about everyone would agree with the idea that animals should be treated humanely. But that is just the vehicle that they are using to try to do away with all animal ownership, period. And that is not a statement that they are being all that public about.

You can become active in this fight by telling your friends and neighbors what is going on. You can be an instrument of education. You can also fight this kind of legislation when it is presented in your area. Go to the City Council meetings and make your voice heard. Write letters to the state and federal government officials to offer your services to be on any animal related committee. In

short get the word out to any and all of your friends that own pets. Let them know what is going on. If enough people stop funding the animal rights organizations, we can put them out of business. There is not much that they can do without operating funds.

The next time you think about making a donation to any of these organizations, you had better think long and hard about whether you really want your money being spent to take away your rights.

Legislative Alerts

Update April 5, 2007

URGENT - CA Spay/Neuter Bill to Be Amended – Continued Opposition Needed!

Assembly Bill 1634, the California bill that will require any dog or cat over the age of four months to be spayed or neutered will be revised with even more burdensome requirements. The bill still does not make any provision for animals in the state only for a short time or those who are competing in a dog show or event. It is imperative that clubs, fanciers and responsible dog owners work together to oppose this legislation.

AB 1634 will be heard by the Assembly Business and Professions Committee on April 10th. Letters need to be sent to the committee to ensure that your opposition is noted for the official bill analysis. If you have already submitted a letter you do NOT need to send an additional letter addressing the amended version.

The **NEW REQUIREMENTS** would allow an owner to purchase an intact animal permit (for an unspecified amount) only if one of the following conditions is met:

- *The breeder is licensed by the local jurisdiction, including proof of a business license, Federal and State tax number or other valid information as determined by the local jurisdiction.*
- *The owner provides proof of EACH of the following:*
- *The dog has competed in at least one legitimate dog show or sporting competition in the past two years, as determined by the local jurisdiction.*
- *That the cat or dog is of a valid breed as recognized by a registry approved by the local jurisdiction.*
- *The dog has earned or is in the process of earning a conformation, obedience, agility, carting, herding, protection, rally, sporting, working or other title from a purebred registry as recognized by the local jurisdiction.*

- *The dog is or is being trained for use by law enforcement agencies or meets the definition of a service dog, guide dog or signal dog as defined by the California State Penal Code.*
- *The dog is trained and used by law enforcement agencies as a search and rescue dog.*
- *Owner provides a letter for a licensed veterinarian stating that due to age, health, or illness it is unsafe to spay or neuter the animal. The letter must include the veterinarian's license number and the date by which the animal can be spayed or neutered if at all possible.*

This draconian legislation would drastically restrict the rights of responsible dog owners and will lead to conflicting ordinances all across the state. A registry that is accepted in one city may not be accepted by the neighboring county. The requirements for a breeder license may also differ from place to place.
