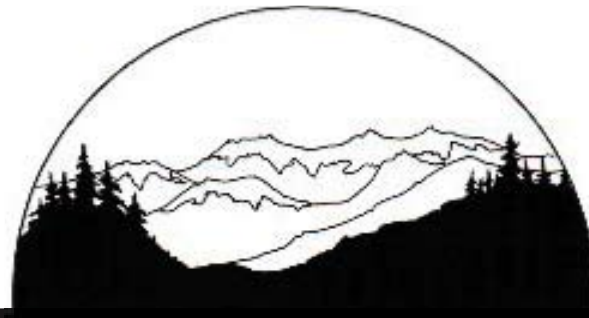

Agility Trial: Thank You

The agility trial went very well. We had a lot of assistance putting up the snow fence and tents, etc and I wish to thank all of you who jumped in and helped. It was sure nice to have help in a lot of the "smaller" chores that we have to double up in. Not smaller in importance, but the little detailed things that we never seem to catch up with.

Thank you so much.

Our entry was a little smaller than last April, but we were against a big USDAA trial in Auburn and the AKC Nationals had just finished. We were happy to have given out 4 MACH ribbons. To earn a MACH (Master Agility Champion) a dog and handler must have 20 double Q's. That is a perfect

score of 100 in Standard and Jumpers with Weaves (both on the same day) is one Double Q. They must also earn 750 points. One point for each second under standard course time and all earned in Excellent B classes.

It's always a pleasure to watch the "Victory Lap" that the MACH handlers do after earning this award.

We did have some rain Saturday but not enough to discourage anyone from running their dogs or even for some visitors coming out to watch.

Again, thank you to all that came out and to all our regulars that are always there helping anywhere they can.

HRKC April 2007 General Meeting

The April general meeting of the Hurricane Ridge Kennel Club was preceded by a video of Dr. Hutchinson conducting a seminar on the pregnant bitch, courtesy of Nancy Tinker.

Officers Present: Joe Larson, President; Ron Fye, Treasurer; Mary Franden, Secretary; Nancy Tinker, Board Member; Melissa Smith, Board Member; Sarah Kincaid, Board Member

An attendance sign-in sheet was circulated: There were 20 members and 5 guests present.

The meeting was called to order by President Joe Larson at 7:25 p.m. on April 18, 2007.

Joe asked for a roll call of the members and guests who were present.

A. Approval of Minutes

Minutes from the March General Meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

B. President's Report

Joe Larson discussed the anti-dog legislation pending in California, and commented on current AKC activities in opposition to this legislation. He also directed attention to the AKC website, www.akc.org for more information.

It was suggested that the "animal rights" organizations that promote the anti-dog/anti-pet legislation are skillful in the usage of terms such as "puppy mill", and noted that the "animal rights" organizations are trying to create divisions within the dog community.

The dog community needs to band together for the common good. The opposition to the anti-pet legislation that is currently pending in many localities needs everybody's support.

C. Secretary's Report

Nothing to report.

D. Treasurer's Report

Ron Fye summarized club expenses, income, profits and net worth year to date, and noted that we did well on the Spring Agility trial. Total expenses for the trial are not yet in.

E. Report of the Committees

AWARDS

Nothing new to report. Nancy Tinker will put a summary together for the newsletter.

HISTORIAN

Nothing to report.

MEMBERSHIP: Nancy Tinker made a motion to bypass the usual new member voting procedure, and reinstate former member Ellen Menshew. The motion passed unanimously.

Jan Garrison handed out membership applications to the guests that were in attendance, and noted that the application can also be found on the website, www.hrkc.org. There are currently two memberships pending.

NEWSLETTER: Patricia Pedersen thanked the group for the excellent material some have sent for the newsletter, and asked members to keep the good stuff coming.

She also reminded members that the deadline for submissions to the newsletter is the first Wednesday of each month, so the newsletter can be published on the second Wednesday of the month. If there is anyone who is not receiving their newsletter, either online or via the regular mail, please contact Patricia.

PUBLIC EDUCATION: Ron Fye introduced the topic of AKC Responsible Dog Ownership activities coming up in September, and asked for a club member to chair the club activities. This could include a "meet the breeds" booth, distribution of AKC printed materials, and/or obedience/rally demonstrations. We need to sign up with AKC prior to the end of July.

TRAINING: Nothing new to report.

2007 SHOW CHAIR: Mariko Saum was absent. Joe read Mariko's report on the status of show activities, including updates on Vendors, Canine Sperm Banking, Judging assignments, Trophies, and the Cavalier club activities.

It was agreed that Nancy Tinker is the Vendor Chair for the non-food vendors, and Irene Snodgrass is the Vendor Chair for food vendors. Chuck Murray will be the Sperm Bank vendor. Robin Kelly is accepting donations for Bred By trophies. Jan Garrison is accepting donations for the remaining trophies.

There was some discussion of who can show their dogs. The following was proposed: "Club members in the following positions: " Show Chair, Hospitality Chair, Obedience Chair" will not personally exhibit their dogs at the show." The proposal was voted on and passed. A second motion was proposed: "Should this statement

be adopted as a permanent amendment?" The second motion was voted on and passed.

OTHER 2007 SHOW ITEMS: Nancy Tinker will contact the Explorers. Flowers will be ordered by Jan Garrison. Rosettes for BOB will be used again this year, as in past years. Chris Cornell will contact Kelly Thomas about mowing. The premium list must be done by no later than May 1st. All changes/additions must be completed by that date.

The show will be dedicated to Margaret Blake and Jessie Baker. We will use the inside front cover to honor Mrs. Blake, and the inside of the back cover to honor Mrs. Baker. A statement honoring Bill Holbrook will be located inside the catalog.

Robin Kelly will follow up on information for parking and bred-by information for the premium.

There was a detailed discussion of advertising. Jan requested that the discussion about advertising take place earlier next year so we can better plan and set fees. There was a motion for no ads for this year. The membership voted to approve. (There will be a small announcement (not an advertisement) in the premium stating that Chuck Murray will be present.)

2008 SHOW CHAIR: Joe Larson will need to get a copy of the 2007 judges list, and will provide copies for the membership, as requested.

AGILITY CHAIR: Nancy Tinker reported that the Spring Agility Trial went very well. Lots of members showed up to help. Nancy thanked them, and noted that it really makes a big difference when people come out to support the trials.

There were four MACH titles completed at the show. Nancy also commented that she received several complaints about the cost of the local hotels, and said that this hurts our entries. Our Fall trial will be held at the Fairgrounds in Elma.

PROGRAMS: Joe Larson read an email from Sharon Smith suggesting that the new director of the Humane Society, Rick Collord, might be a speaker of interest. Chris Cornell volunteered to contact him, and ask if he would like to come talk to us in either May, June, or September. Chris

will provide information on the date to Patricia for inclusion in the newsletter.

Joe noted that if Rick is not scheduled for the May meeting, we can continue with the Dr. Hutchinson video seminar series. The next video, about nutrition for the brood bitch, is scheduled for May 16th at 6:00 p.m. Members who are interested in viewing the video can come at 6:00; otherwise, the regular meeting will begin at 7:00, as usual.

WEBSITE: Mary Franden reported on the re-design of the HRKC website, and passed around samples of the new design created by Patricia Pedersen. Patricia needs photos of club members and their dogs to complete the design. If you have photos you can send her, they would be greatly appreciated. If anyone would like, Patricia can take the photos for you.

F. Unfinished Business

Unfinished business included questions about this year's judging panel. We will have six conformation judges this year. For anyone who is interested in the details, Joe Larson has the list.

There was also a question about inviting judges to the Cavalier Club's Friday BBQ, for those judges who will be here by Friday evening. Mariko Saum will follow up.

G. New Business

Ron Fye reported that the club has a CD coming up for renewal on May 16th. Ron proposed that he roll it over if rates are comparable, and contact the board for input if they are not. The membership voted to approve Ron's proposal.

The topic of possible loss of access to the Blake Family property for future shows was introduced. Charlotte Metzler volunteered her property on the west end of Port Angeles as a possible show site. It is approximately 80 acres, grass/hay, fairly level. Someone would need to take a look at it and determine its feasibility. Joe Larson suggested that we revisit the topic after this year's show is over.

Joe Larson directed the membership's attention to the advertisement in the April newsletter about the upcoming Myra Savant Harris seminar.

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Bad Pet Owners Are the Ones to Snip

To spay or not to spay—That is the question in California

Almost everyone would agree that there are too many unwanted pets in California, and that reducing that number would be a worthy end. But when it comes to the means to achieve that end, people will fight like cats and dogs.

Consider, for example, the bitter battle over California Assembly Bill 1634, also known as the “California Healthy Pets Act,” which is now working its way through the Legislature.

The proposed new law would require that, with a few exceptions, every single dog and cat in the state that’s over 4 months old would have to be spayed or neutered. Dog breeders and owners of show or competition or working dogs could be exempted if they got a local “intact permit” – for an as-yet-unspecified fee – as would people who could get a letter from a veterinarian saying their animal is too old or sick to undergo the procedure. For every other dog and cat it would be snip-snip time, with violators – the owners, that is, not the dog or the cat – subject to a \$500 fine.

It’s hard to say how many of the estimated 15 million or so pet dogs and cats in California are already sterilized and how many aren’t. But if enacted, AB1634 would mandate the most massive pet sterilization program in American history.

So is it a good idea? Or a draconian governmental intrusion on the rights of pet owners?

The bill’s author, Assemblyman Lloyd Levine (D-Van Nuys), and its many supporters – which range from

the California Animal Control Directors Association to a group called the Canine Crusaders – say the measure is desperately needed. They say that every year some 500,000 unwanted dogs and cats wind up in animal shelters statewide, of which about 300,000 are ultimately killed. And they insist the legislation is primarily aimed at irresponsible pet owners who allow their animals to roam and reproduce indiscriminately.

“We won’t have dog and cat police going door to door lifting up your animal’s leg to check” if it has been spayed or neutered, Levine said in a radio interview last month. Although the law would cover all dogs and cats, supporters say enforcement would be directed at people whose pets come in contact with animal control officers – and even they could avoid the \$500 fine if they subsequently got their animal “fixed.”

But the many opponents of the measure, who range from breeders to pure-breed cat and canine clubs to something called SoCal BARF (short for “Biologically Appropriate Raw Feeders”), believe the mandatory spay/neuter bill is a Big Brother-ish attempt by government to stick its nose where it doesn’t belong – which is to say, in their pets’ nether parts.

“It’s Orwellian,” says Kay Novotny of La Palma, who has three Borzois – some people describe them as “long-haired greyhounds” – that she raised for shows and competitions. “We all agree there are too many animals in shelters, but this isn’t going to solve the problem. The vast majority of pet owners are responsible people, and they’re the ones who will be punished. The scofflaws will still be scofflaws.”

In fact, Novotny and others say that in addition to putting a financial

burden on responsible pet owners, and allowing the government to make health decisions for their pets, the bill might actually exacerbate the problem by prompting irresponsible pet owners to dump their animals rather than get them fixed. And despite what Assemblyman Levine says, they aren’t so sure there wouldn’t be “dog and cat police” checking for compliance – and even if they didn’t, the law could still make lawbreakers out of millions of responsible pet owners who aren’t part of the problem.

Well, both sides have good arguments on the proposed mandatory spay/neuter law – too many to fully go into here. And it’s not my place to tell you what to think on the issue.

Still, personally I have to wonder about a law that casts such a wide net, one that mandates restrictions on the responsible many because of the irresponsible actions of the relative few. It seems like we have too many laws like that as it is.

In any event, if you want to sound off on Assembly Bill 1634, pro or con, contact your California Assembly person. To find out who that is, and how to contact them, check the “state government” listings in the front of your phone book, or go to www.legislature.ca.gov and click on “Legislators and Districts.” If you don’t have Internet access, ask someone to do it for you.

In the meantime, I’d like to propose another law, one that would require the forcible spaying or neutering of any human who abuses or abandons a dog or cat.

Yes, I know, some people might say that’s a little harsh. But in addition to improving the gene pool, unlike a lot of laws, current and proposed, at least it would put the punishment on the guilty.

And leave the innocent alone.
