Saffron & I at the Inaugural AKC Scentwork Master National Championship! Wilmington, OH - A 3-Day Adventure in Speed & Precision

Saffron and I had an unforgettable time at the inaugural AKC Scentwork Master National Championship in Wilmington, OH. We competed over three days, tackling 16 different searches that tested both speed and accuracy.

The competition was fierce, with 168 teams of seasoned AKC Scentwork Masters—many of them having earned their Detective titles.

We made it into the Finals, where we had two challenging searches:

- Exterior/Buried Search: 2.5 minutes to search, and by the time it was our turn, the hides had been set hours before, making it a tough search. Unfortunately, we had two false alerts, which cost us valuable points.
- Interior/Container Search: Saffron really shone in this one! She nailed it, and I was so proud of her work.

In the end, we placed 75th out of 100, but more what will! importantly, we got to be part of an amazing group of competitors. The talent and teamwork Happy Sniffing! were inspiring, and it was so wonderful to meet new friends and their incredible Scentwork dogs. Steve wanted to talk about the logistics of putting the shows together because no one has the whole picture. The Club has wanted to create Standard Operating Procedure manuals for events to help us coordinate and allow volunteers to step in and know what to do if necessary. We decided now was the time.

Steve put together a template that was broad but could be modified depending on what part of the event or function it addressed. It included a picture of the grounds, diagrams, and equipment/volunteer needs. In addition, we need to know which trailer items go into, and we need an inventory list for each trailer. We talked about where to put the trailers that would be closer together but convenient. And, we agreed to schedule a work party after the agility trials to organize the trailers (Spring 2026).

We discussed some parking issues that need to be resolved (including ADA and parking signs), number of Sanicans, the Eye Clinic, coffee and food vendors, setup/tear down, event schedule, and volunteer communication/coordination during the event. The Club sent a letter to the City of Sequim to thank them for the use of the Carrie Blake Park facilities for all our events. We appreciate being able to use these facilities.

Thank you to everyone—volunteers, participants, and supporters—who contribute to the success of our events each year. We couldn't do it without you!

# HRKC in the Community

#### Fun Walks

Hi that's me Giovanna, (but you can call me " Gio ").

That's the Pacific Ocean in the background, and yes I was born with those ears. They help me listen for rabbits and squirrels when Mom takes me on hikes and we do our HRKC Fun Walks, (more about Fun Walks later). I have a keen sense of smell and of course those ears allow me to hear those rabbits, small wild game and little critters that my breed hunts in Sicily.

I still haven't come across any rabbits here but my Mom got me a life size white rabbit which hides under a bush in my yard, (She says it's a statue but I still sniff it to make sure it isn't a real rabbit). # For the Love of Dog – Get a Massage

Dogs hide their aches and pains really well. In a show dog this can mean less than optimal performance. Signs of illness or injury can show up in numerous ways. Massage therapists can locate and identify problem areas before they become serious. You can help by being observant. Is your dog moving differently? Is he or she reluctant to jump up or down or participate in your usual activities?

Signs of an issue can be any of the following:

- a. Performance
  - i. Poor movement, lack of concentration, unable to stand square
- b. Character
  - i. Changes in personality, unwillingness or reluctance to perform or be touched
  - ii. Appearance; dull coat, twitching, lethargy

#### c. Gait

i. Crabbing, pacing, lameness, lack of reach or drive

#### d. Posture

i. Roached or swayed back, unbalanced, poor tail carriage

Regular massage helps with earlier detection of problems, stimulates synovial fluids so joint stay lubricated, improves symmetry of movement, and improves circulation which increases nutrition through the bloodstream and removes waste product.

Can I massage my own dog? The short answer is yes, definitely. Remember touch with healing intent is always good. Your dog must be a willing partner in the process, which develops a deeper connection with your pet. Look for signs that your dog is 'done' Continued right

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and accept their signals if they walk away. Always be very slow, light, and sensitive with your touch. Dog bodies are much more delicate than their human counterparts.

Massage therapists are trained in anatomy, kinesiology, specific techniques, and safety, so I wouldn't recommend starting without some training. I recommend a great book by my mentor, Megan Ayrault: The Dog Lover's Guide to Massage.

What does it mean to be a massage therapist in Washington? You can't just hang out a shingle. The requirements include; 300 hours of study (reading, lecture and hands-on), passing a national exam administered by NBCAAM, passing a WA State Licensing exam, maintaining records, and completing continuing education.

Massage is not a substitute for veterinary care. Massage therapists cannot diagnose. Always talk to you vet about whether your pet is a candidate for massage therapy.
